Prize Giving is traditionally known as Academies in Jesuit schools. It is an opportunity to recognize the achievements of the pupils by awarding prizes in the various academic disciplines. Academies was also an occasion on which dramatic, musical and gymnastic performances were given. The first Prize Giving at Wimbledon College took place in July 1892 (the school opened in January that year). It was hurriedly arranged when the bishop announced he would be visiting the new school. The founding Head Master, Fr James Nicholson SJ, noted that "although examinations had not been held it was hurriedly arranged to distribute the prizes, choosing prize boys ex praecognitis."

The Head Master's prizes are awarded to boys who have made outstanding progress in their studies and a significant contribution to the life of the school. These prizes were formerly known as Fr Rector's Prizes. However, as there are now no Rectors in the British Jesuit Province, the title of the prize has been changed.
