| | living below a standard of living generally accepted and forming the usual pattern of life in a particular society |
| | the whole range of welfare provision, including that provided by the state, private, voluntary, community and family organizations and groups. |
| | the dividing point between the poor and the non-poor |
| | where one aspect of poverty feeds into another, making poverty worse |
| | property in the form of assets which can be sold and turned into cash |
| | an independent, non-official, non-profit-making group or organization |
| | this is provided by family or friends |
| | an organization that tries to get those with power in society to implement policies which it favours |
| | lacking the opportunity or resources to fully join in with society and being cut off from what most would regard as a normal life |
| | a group right at the bottom of the social hierarchy, in some ways different or cut off from the rest of society |
| | a set of beliefs and values preventing the poor escaping from poverty |
| | those who need the least help get the most, and those who need the most help get the least |
| | this provides an unearned income for its owner |
| | this is for use by its owner but doesn't produce any income |
| | people being pushed, for various reasons, to the edges of society and unable to play a full part in society |
| | rewards that people get when they sell their skills in the labour market |
| | a flow of money from work, investments or the state |
| | a set of values and way of life centred on an expectation of being supported by welfare benefits |
| | these explanations of poverty concentrate on the norms and values of a community |
