a small practice run before conducting a full survey
data that sociologists haven't collected themselves
a means of collecting primary data from large numbers of people, usually in statistical form
the extent to which the findings of research provide a true or genuine picture of what is being studied
when asking questions, the risk that researchers might be imposing their own views rather than getting at what respondents
really think
data concerned with meanings and understandings
an idea the researcher guesses might be true
this is concerned with the morals and principles that govern the way research should be carried out
a smaller group drawn from a survey population, of which it contains a good cross-section
a means of selecting a smaller group of individuals from a survey population for investigation.
a list of names of all those in the survey population
a perspective that concentrates on understanding the meanings that people give to their behaviour
the use of a variety of methods in a single piece of research
the use of several methods in a single piece of research to check the reliability and validity of the information collected
when a participant observer reveals to those being observed his or her real identity and purpose
this is when the participant observer conceals his or her real intentions
