## Thank you for your Advent contributions

A huge thank you to everyone who has supported our Advent charitable activities. We have piled up the Dons Local Action van with an impressive amount of donations of food, delivered loads of really thoughtfully chosen gifts to the Salvation Army, sent off a package stuffed with greetings cards to the Jesuit Refugee Service to bring some cheer to refugees being kept in detention this Christmas, raised £1350 at our Joint Carol Service with the Ursuline High School for the Passage homeless charity, and raised over £2200 so far for Jesuit Missions from our non-uniform day, fundraising challenges and raffle. We have still had only about half of parents contributing for the non-uniform day, so hopefully this number will rise even further.

We are hugely grateful for all your generosity and support.

# Careers/PSHE update

This half term we were able to enhance our PSHE programme by inviting in some very interesting and inspirational external speakers. Our Grammar students heard from Cairo who works for the St Giles' charity about the dangers of exploitation and county lines. This was a very emotive session and one in which boys showed a great deal of maturity whilst listening to. Our Rudiments boys were very fortunate to have the Metropolitan Police, London Fire Brigade and NHS visit two weeks ago, to deliver an insightful 'Safety First' day. To acknowledge Anti-bullying Week in November, Stand Against Violence came and delivered two assemblies to our Figures and Rudiments students and got them to consider the importance of not being a bystander should they witness bullying.

Thank you to all who have helped us give our students a very varied and interesting career talks programme this term. These include PWC and the presentation to Rhetoric students they delivered about the degree apprenticeship programme, alumni Andrew Harding discussing his online start up company and Belberdos Landscapes discussing a career in landscape design and gardening.

### **School Council**

Following on from the School Council caucus which took place during PSHE a representative from each tutor group from across the school met on Friday 10<sup>th</sup> November for the School Council meeting. As a school an area that we are focussing on is reading and the focus of this meeting was 'Reading for Pleasure.' Working in their houses pupils produced a presentation which considered how frequently they read, what the benefits are of reading for pleasure, what the school can do to support them to read for pleasure more frequently and how reading for pleasure fits in with the qualities from the Jesuit Pupil Profile. These presentations were shared with the College's leadership team.

This half term as a school community we have also celebrated Polish Independence Day on 11<sup>th</sup> November and Human Rights Day on 10<sup>th</sup> December.

### Drama

Our Christmas production of *The Addams Family* by Marshall Brickman, Rick Elice and Andrew Lippa was judged to be a roaring success, and we are very proud of all our students who worked so hard and made it a production to remember! There are many more drama projects to get involved in throughout the year. Next term will see Stage 1 Drama Club performing with King's College Community Production and Stage 2 Drama Club performing their play in Connections, the National Theatre annual nationwide youth theatre festival.

#### Model United Nations Conference

Fifteen pupils from the More Able cohorts of Lower Grammar, Grammar and Syntax took part in a Model United Nations conference at Mulberry School for Girls in mid-December. This two-day conference simulates the machinations and negotiations of a real UN meeting, and pupils were given countries as diverse as Chad, China and Canada to represent in their committees. The topic was a serious and a salient one: the scarcity of potable water in certain areas of the world, and what can be done to solve this problem. The organisers were delighted with the efforts and application of all our delegates, with prizes going to Paul Zogbessou (Lower Grammar - most improved delegate) and Charlie Wilson (Syntax - negotiating skills).

#### Jack Petchey Speak Out

The English Department was delighted once more to see some wonderful examples of public speaking in this year's Jack Petchey Speak Out competition. Workshops for 60 boys in Grammar early in the school year saw six boys progress to the Wimbledon College Assembly Final, where they had the daunting task of performing in front of the serried ranks of their entire year group. Finalists, Ozan Andersson, Neal Chumroo, Bruno Aslanian, Gui Aquino and Hunor Szantai performed with poise and aplomb, receiving excellent feedback from resident judges, Miss Walker, Miss Charlton and Mr Van der Hoeven. In the end, Hunor was runner-up with a well-structured speech on the power of nostalgia, while Neal

took first prize with a remarkably engaging performance, taking inspiration from his recent Model UN experience to speak powerfully about the issue of water shortages around the globe. These two will go on to represent the school in the Merton Regional Final next year.

# Support with the purchasing of College uniform

I am aware that families may be finding it difficult to purchase items of school uniform at the current time due to financial reasons. We do have provision in place to support our families. I would ask, if you find yourself in a position where your child needs items of school uniform and you are unable to purchase them for financial reasons, that you contact your child's Head of Line in the first instance and we will do what we can to provide the appropriate support.

## School Uniform expectations

Thank you to all parents who have ensured that your children are wearing the correct school uniform, not only in school but on their way to and from school.

There are however a number of boys who are wearing incorrect shoes and coats. I ask that you ensure your child[ren] as [are] wearing the correct uniform when they return to College in January. This includes formal black shoes and appropriate overcoats.

Please be aware that the expectation on coats are that they are plain black, with sleeves and without logos. Hoods are allowed but are not to be worn in school. I must also point out that coats are to be worn over blazers and not instead of them.

I would ask that you check the School Uniform List before buying any school uniform.

### **Expensive coats**

We have been asked by the Police to inform all parents that there is, unfortunately, an increase in the number of cases where school pupils are being threatened to hand over expensive/designer coats.

If pupils are wearing coats in line with the school uniform code this should not be an issue however I want to make you aware of this crime and for your children to be conscious of the increased risk if they are wearing expensive coats over the holiday period.
